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## "WHY LITERARY STUDIES ISN'T TALKING ABOUT THE INTERNET NOVEL."

"Novels foregrounding the internet have existed since the mid 1990s, although the term 'internet novel' has only recently taken off. Earlier internet novels tended to play with format---mimicking hypertext links, email threads, and PowerPoint slideshows. More recent works still experiment with born-digital genres such as Twitter messages, though they equally invoke the internet at the structural level through multiple, interweaving storylines or via characterisation exploring individuals' social-media dependency.

Most prominent among the recent crop of internet novels is Patricia Lockwood's *No One is Talking About This* (2021) which, among other accolades, was shortlisted for the 2021 Booker Prize. The highly autobiographical plot follows a minor social-media celebrity whose online persona threatens to consume her life entirely. It is only when her sister's unborn child is diagnosed with a life-threatening genetic abnormality that she snaps out of her solipsism and wades into the overwhelming tides of real-world emotions. The book remediates characteristics of 'the portal' (p.3) in its brief fragments of text, often aberrantly juxtaposed. Moreover, the book's production uses typeface changes, emojis and other design elements to evoke the experience of browsing Twitter's infinite scroll.

*No One* is closely intertwined with the encompassing digital literary sphere. Lockwood's prior Twitter fame and globetrotting appearances at writers' festivals are not only the subject of the book's first half but were routinely mentioned in early reviews. The book's recursive relationship to its own conditions of existence reaches its apogee in a one-minute video made by the Booker Prize administrators to publicise shortlisted titles. An actress reads a two-paragraph excerpt from the novel while viewers are transported through a riot of internet-native interfaces, emerging as psychologically overloaded and 'internet poisoned' (p.76) as the book's protagonist. My analysis of *No One* is emblematic of how literary studies can reinvigorate its method in the wake of postcritical exhaustion. Attending to the medial qualities of books themselves and their circuits of participation in the online world demonstrates how profoundly literary culture is now interwoven with digital technologies."

Practitioners from a variety of contexts — mental health clinics, hospitals, addiction clinics, libraries, community centres and so on — and researchers from a range of disciplines are invited to share their experience, data & insights, questions & hopes for the future. We invite proposals for short papers and project presentations (15-20 minutes) exploring the potential of reading to promote flourishing in individuals and communities.
